Aims:

To provide students with an overview of the current contexts of rural England and the nature and role of the church in a variety of rural

communities.

To equip students with critical and reflective tools and understanding to enable them to develop a theological and missiological response to some of the challenges of rural ministry and mission.

To develop an understanding of some of the concepts and skills needed for leadership in a rural multi-church / parish situation.

To encourage students to develop the collaborative and facilitation skills,

sensitivities and dispositions appropriate to rural ministry.

Content: An exploration of the demographic, social, economic and cultural

changes in rural contexts in Britain in recent years and how these have

affected the church in the countryside.

Missional and ecclesiological responses to rural contexts, including the benefits and constraints of different approaches to multi-church / parish

ministry.

An exploration of the skills needed for leadership, partnership working, ecumenical working, collaboration and enabling of lay people in multi-

church ministry.

Classroom study will be related to the experience of one or more

placements in rural contexts.
