Aims: To enable students to understand and analyse theological, liturgical

and pastoral responses to the different stages of the human life cycle.

To enable students to reflect critically on their own experience of the human life cycle and on their own emergent ministerial practice.

Content: This module will look theologically, liturgically and pastorally at different

stages of the human life cycle:

Christian rites of passage – baptisms, marriages and funerals - as a framework to investigate how pastoral needs change through life and may be addressed in part by rites of passage.

The life stages of, for instance, birth, adulthood, parenthood, middle age, ageing and death will be investigated theologically, with opportunities for the student to reflect on their own experience and on ministerial practice.

Scripture will be examined as a resource for reflection and practice.

The module will encourage the student to build up skills and competences in providing informed pastoral care for people at different stages of the human life cycle and providing appropriate ritual which meets theological and pastoral needs, including an understanding of best practice in safeguarding, child protection and the protection of vulnerable adults and how to apply these in a range of contexts.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this module students will be able to:

Subject Knowledge [SSK 3]

Offer a detailed account and analysis of the challenges and opportunities presented at one or more stages in the human life cycle, in spiritual, social and psychological terms.

Develop their skills in theologically-informed and proactive pastoral support for people negotiating different life stages, including demonstrating pastoral empathy and flexibility as a reflective practitioner in relation to those navigating different life stages.

Analyse and reflect on their own, and others', experience of different life stages, with awareness of resultant vulnerabilities and strengths.

Lead pastoral liturgies with confidence and integrity, taking account of changing culture and context, and reflecting together with others on their performance.
