Aims:	To enable students to understand the interaction of claims from the natural sciences with a range of theological positions.
	To equip students with the skills necessary to evaluate the critiques of the Christian tradition arising out of the environmental crisis, as described in science and ecotheology.
Content:	A study of the range of possible interactions of the natural sciences with theology, e.g. using a published taxonomy of interactions, and historical and contemporary examples.
	An outline of the contemporary environmental crisis as described by ecological science.
	An evaluation of a range of critiques of the Christian tradition from within the literature of ecotheology (such as critiques of anthropocentrism, over-dependence on eschatology, patriarchy etc).
	An evaluation of one or more specific ecological issues (such as climate change) as an example of science interacting with theology.
	An evaluation of strategies in Christian ecotheological ethics such as human as steward and as created co-creator.
