Aims: To enable students to gain an overview of global Christian

engagement with issues surrounding justice, human development,

economics and the natural environment.

To develop a critical appreciation of the interplay of biblical theology,

missional praxis and cultural context.

To reflect on the implications of global inequalities and environmental

changes for Christians in the West.

To encourage students to relate global issues of justice and

environment to their own context.

Content: This module will focus on the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> centuries and:

study the history of Christian engagement with issues of justice,

development and environment,

reflect critically on the theological and missiological implications of data on human development indices, population growth, conflict, and

environmental change,

assess the theological and practical responses of both the majority world church, and of western agencies and churches, to issues of

justice and environment.
