




"Technology-enabled, sustained, moderated, people-to-people educational programmes"

- People-to-people real time dialogue
- Interactions are facilitated to ensure they are meaningful
- A virtual exchange is a sustained designed pedagogical process
- It is technology-enabled



What makes it unique


- Scalability and inclusivity
- Experiential learning
- Community of trust
- Learner-led approach





Virtual Exchange can be integrated in higher education in many different ways. Educators have now moved all classes online - VE can add an international and intercultural dimension.

- Have your students participate in a 'ready made' virtual exchange as a component of a course
- Follow short training and develop a collaborative virtual exchange with a colleague in another country.



The Erasmus+ Virtual Exchange project Stephanie Siklossy



- European Commission pilot project, expanding the reach and scope of the Erasmus+ programme through Virtual Exchange
- An accessible, innovative way for young people to engage in meaningful intercultural experiences online
- Goal: foster mutual understanding and skills development
- **Target** of 25,000 youth in 2018-2020, future upscale
- Implemented by a consortium of 8 organisations




















Target Audiences

Exchange activities are open to any young person aged 18-30 residing in Erasmus+ programme countries and the Southern Mediterranean

What Erasmus+ Virtual Exchange offers


FOR STUDENTS







Impact

- 87% satisfaction among young people
- 88% reported increased ability to work in a culturally diverse place
- 76% improved their digital competencies
- 76% improved their teamwork and collaborative problem-solving skills
- 71% built meaningful relationships with peers from other countries/regions
- 91% described what they learned about people from other cultures as (very) positive

Why now?


Continuity of education during disruption.

What are the Interactive Courses?

Interactive Open Online Courses (iOOCs)

Original Lecture series by expert academics and practitioners.

Dialogue: Small, facilitator-led sessions and interactive assignments.

Socio-political issues: Topical themes on current affairs.

Upcoming spring/summer courses: <u>'Youth, Peace and Conflict', 'Countering Hate Speech', 'Sustainable Food Systems: A Mediterranean Perspective'</u>

What are Dialogue Exchanges?


Dialogue Exchanges focus on skill-building

Dialogue: Encourages thoughtful discourse in facilitator-led sessions

Global issues: menu of global topics.

Upcoming fall/winter: 'Connect Global', 'Connect Collaborate', 'Connect Express'

integrated across disciplines • global skills and attitudes

Students at university and other HEIs.

Young professionals and members of youth organisations.


Professors and educators offering the course.

How do I implement iOOCs & CP?

Stand-alone course: Just get students to register!

Tailor-made: choose a model of integration that works for you

lecture series • socio-political issues • facilitator-led, small group dialogue •



What do they gain?

ECTS 1-3 credits (CP) 3-5 credits (iOOC)

Badges: Erasmus+ digital Badges

Transversal skills: self-esteem, curiosity, empathy, resilience, intercultural communication.

International, intercultural experience and...solidarity!



Trainings to design a Virtual Exchange project

For **teaching & administrative staff** to learn how to create a Transnational Erasmus+ Virtual Exchange Project (TEP) (4/6 weeks, 2-3 h a week, in English or French), to enrich and expand existing courses and programmes.

How to implement TEPs in HEIs: Examples

- As pre-mobility activity
- Integrating VE in already existing/future projects/network
- Innovating the educational offer: new joint and flexible curricula / challenge-based short term learning programmes
- Joint staff training strategies
- Online placements

Recap: What can educators do with E+ Virtual Exchange

	Engage students in Exchanges ready-made, different types of integration	Develop a Transnational E+VE Project (TEP)
Content	Thematic focus & transversal skills: video lecture series on socio-political issues, interactive assignments, e.g, 'Youth, Peace & Conflict', 'Countering Hate Speech', 'Connect Programme' and more.	You will need to go through the training first, no need to have a partner already, any theme
Duration	from 4 to 10 weeks	you decide (3 to 8 weeks)
Student Workload	5-10 hours per week - depends on the activity	you decide, best if fits into normal workload expected
Educator engagement level	Minimal or collaborative - depends if the course is integrated in your programme	High - you will be designing and implementing your own exchange

What about students?

Erasmus+ Virtual Exchange offers a number of activities to which students can sign up independently without the need to involve teaching staff. Example of activities where students can apply directly are 'Social Circles' and the Interactive Open Online Courses, like 'Youth, Peace and Conflict', 'Countering Hate Speech', 'Sustainable Food Systems: A Mediterranean Perspective'.




