INTRODUCTION

International boundaries continue to be a major source of friction between neighbouring states. Many land boundaries remain poorly defined and only just over half of the world's potential maritime boundaries have been even partially agreed. Governments recognise the value of clearly-defined boundaries, yet the political, economic and social complexities of boundary regions often make resolving competing territorial and jurisdictional claims extraordinarily difficult.

Led by experienced boundary negotiators, technical experts and legal advisors, this workshop will provide advice and practical guidance on how to resolve international boundary disputes. Through a combination of lectures and practical exercises, the course will first explore how to overcome deadlock in boundary negotiations. Recognising that an equitable agreement cannot always be reached through negotiations, the workshop will also examine the options of dispute resolution involving third-party mediation, conciliation, arbitration and adjudication.

Mr Juan Jeannet Arce, Political Affairs Officer, United Nations Secretariat, serves in the Mediation Support Unit (MSU) in New York. The MSU, housed in the UN Department of Political and Peacebuilding Affairs, is the office responsible for providing support to on-going mediation, good offices, and preventive diplomacy efforts. In this role, Juan coordinates the work of the Standby Team of Senior Mediation Advisers, and is the focal point for mediation support in the Middle East, Gulf, and Afghanistan. Previously he was the focal point for the Americas and Caribbean, and in this context supported the facilitated talks between the Government of Colombia and the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC), and advised on UN efforts to mediate in the Guyana-Venezuela border controversy. Prior to this role, he served with the United Nations Assistance Mission in Afghanistan in support of Afghan peace and reconciliation efforts, and before that in the Security Council Affairs Division at UN Headquarters, focused on the use of targeted sanctions against

China arbitration. Yuri joined Foley Hoag in 2009 after his eight-year public international law practice at the Office of the Legal Adviser of the Ukrainian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Embassy of Ukraine in the United States.

Derek represents government clients with regard to the settlement of international boundary disputes, with a particular emphasis on those that implicate oil and gas development. Derek represents governments and state entities in international arbitration and other dispute settlement proceedings, including at ICSID, the ICC and the International Court of Justice. He also works with governments of petroleum producing countries and national oil companies in the full range of matters related to oil and gas exploration, production and monetization, including the resolution of disputes.



Ms Alejandra Torres Camprubi, Foley Hoag LLP, is an international dispute resolution attorney in Foley Hoag's International Litigation and Arbitration Department. Based in the firm's Paris office, Alejandra is admitted to practice in the Madrid Bar as well as the Paris Bar as an EU lawyer. She focuses her practice on public international law, international investment arbitration, and set-aside proceedings before French courts. She has particular experience representing sovereign States and State-owned entities in arbitration proceedings administered by ICSID and the PCA, as well as in inter-State cases before the ICJ and ITLOS. She acted as legal counsel in the United Nations climate change negotiations and has recently been a post-doctoral research fellow at the Fridtjof Nansen Institute in Oslo, as part of an international and interdisciplinary project on the legal consequences of the Anthropocene for International Law.



Professor Dr. Rudiger Wolfrum, Managing Director, Max Planck Foundation for International Peace and the Rule of Law, is a Professor of International Public Law and a former Judge at the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea (ITLOS) where he served from 1996 to 2017. He was Vice Presuident of ITLOS 1996-1999 and President of ITLOS from 2005-2008. He is a Member of the International Environmental Board of Arbitration, The Hague (since 2001), has been a Member of the Arbitration Panel on Antarctica since 2017, and has been a member of several international arbitral tribunals such as Chagos Archipelago (Mauritius v. United Kingdom) and the South China Sea (Philippines v. China). Since 2013, he has been the Managing Director of the Max Planck Foundation for International Peace and the Rule of Law.
